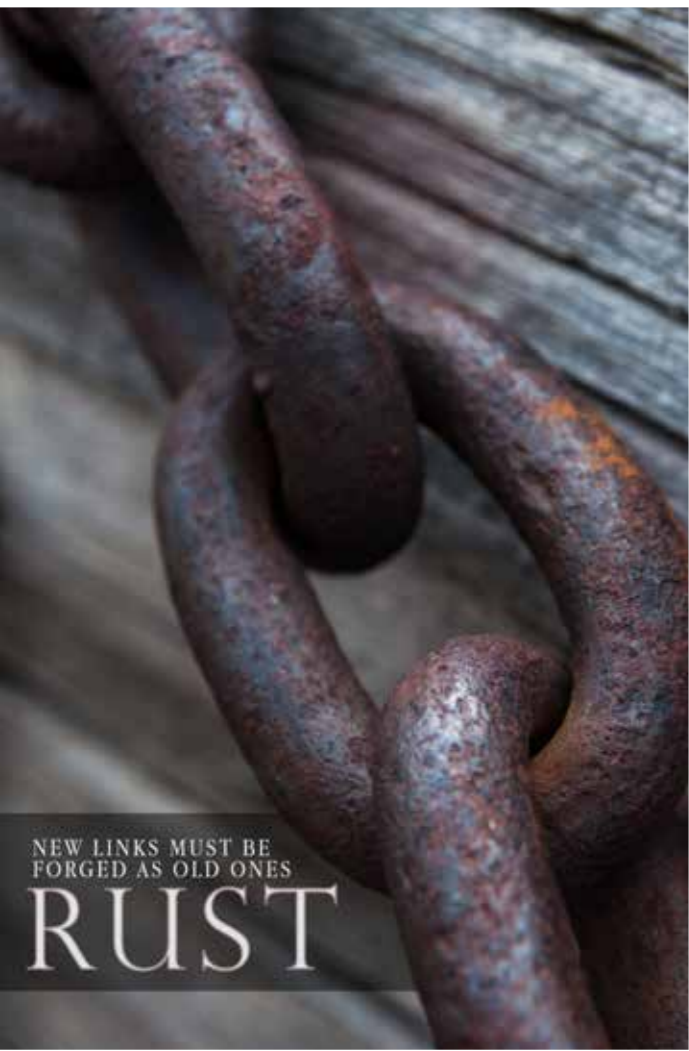
DEPTH OF FIELD.

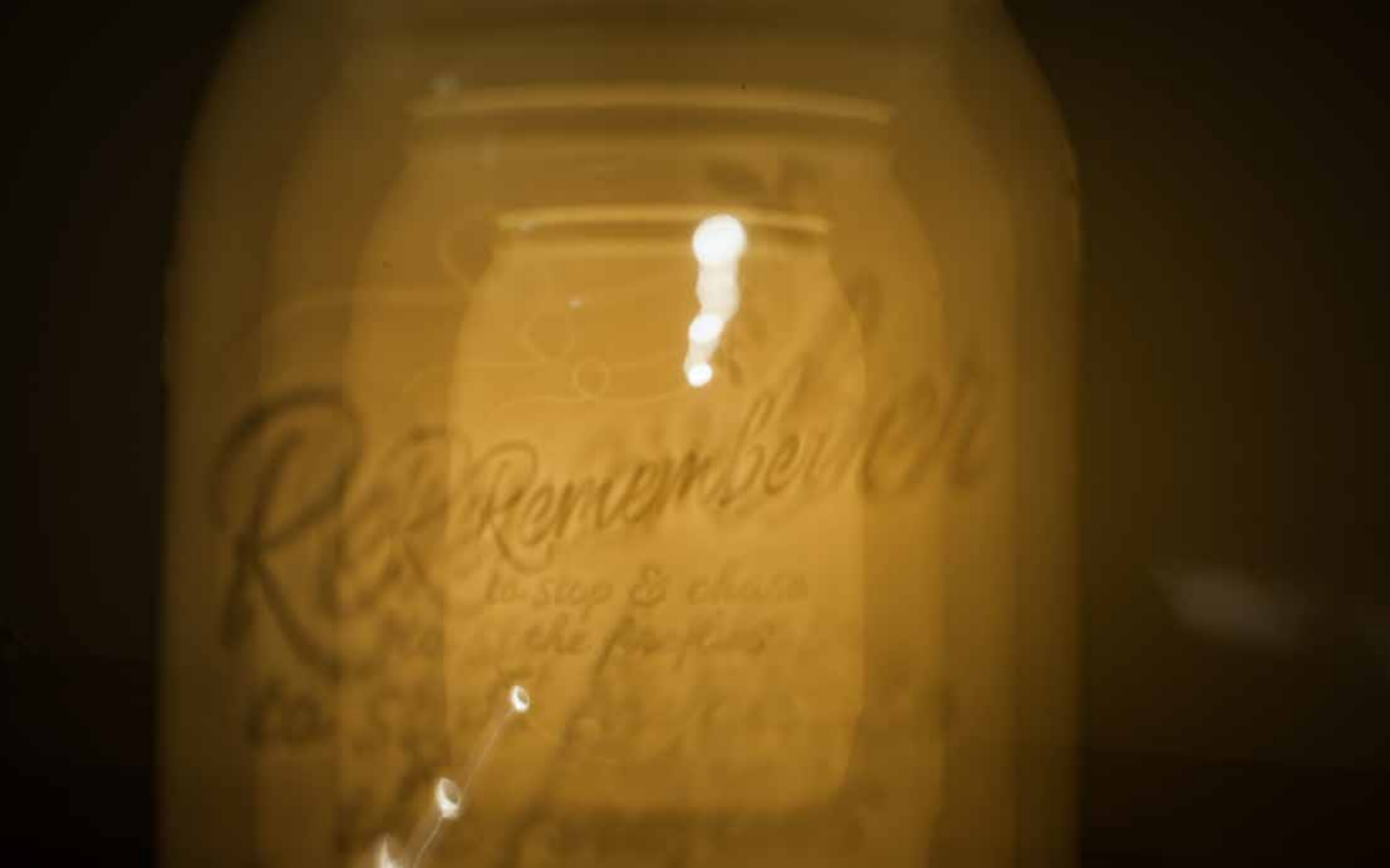

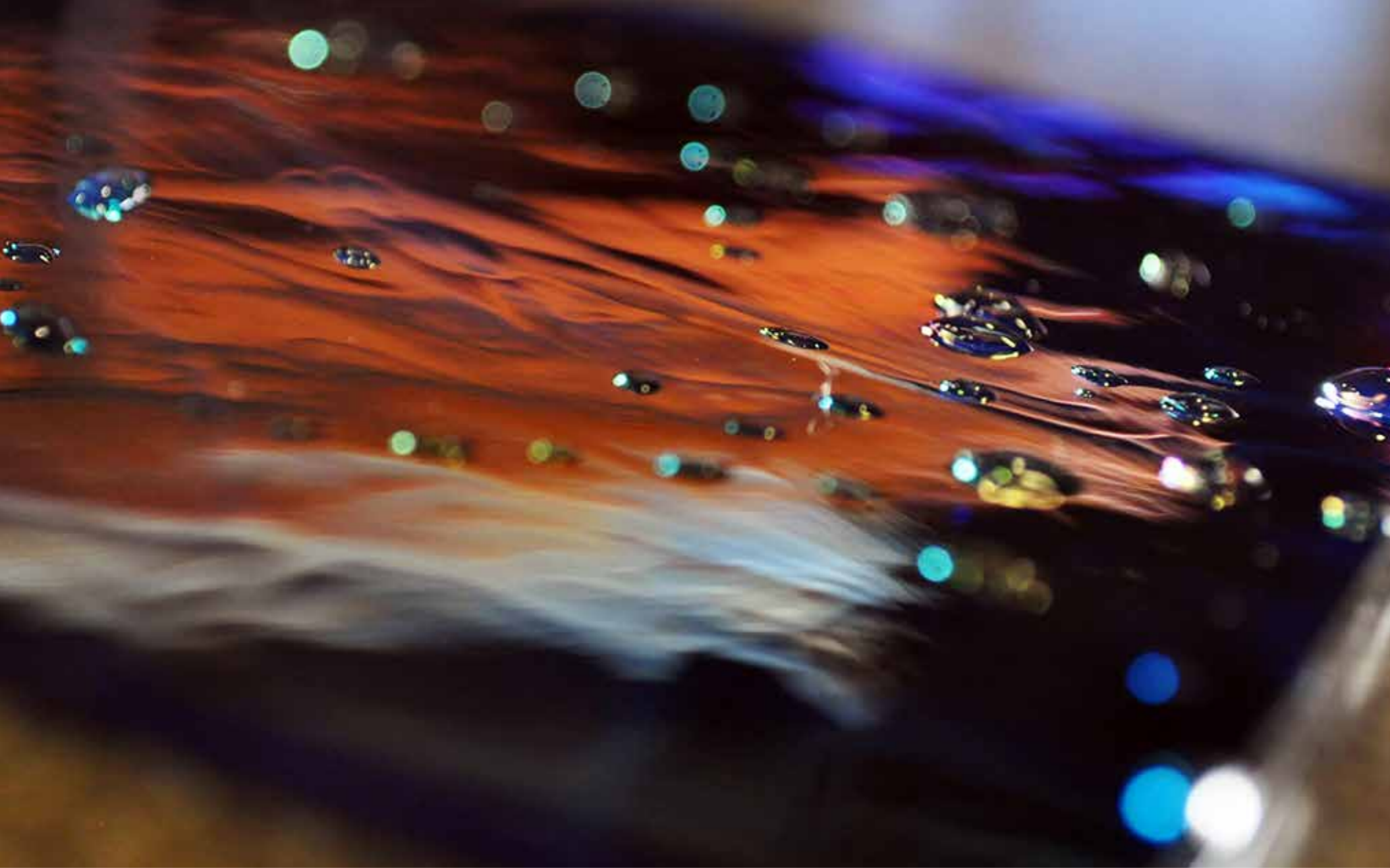

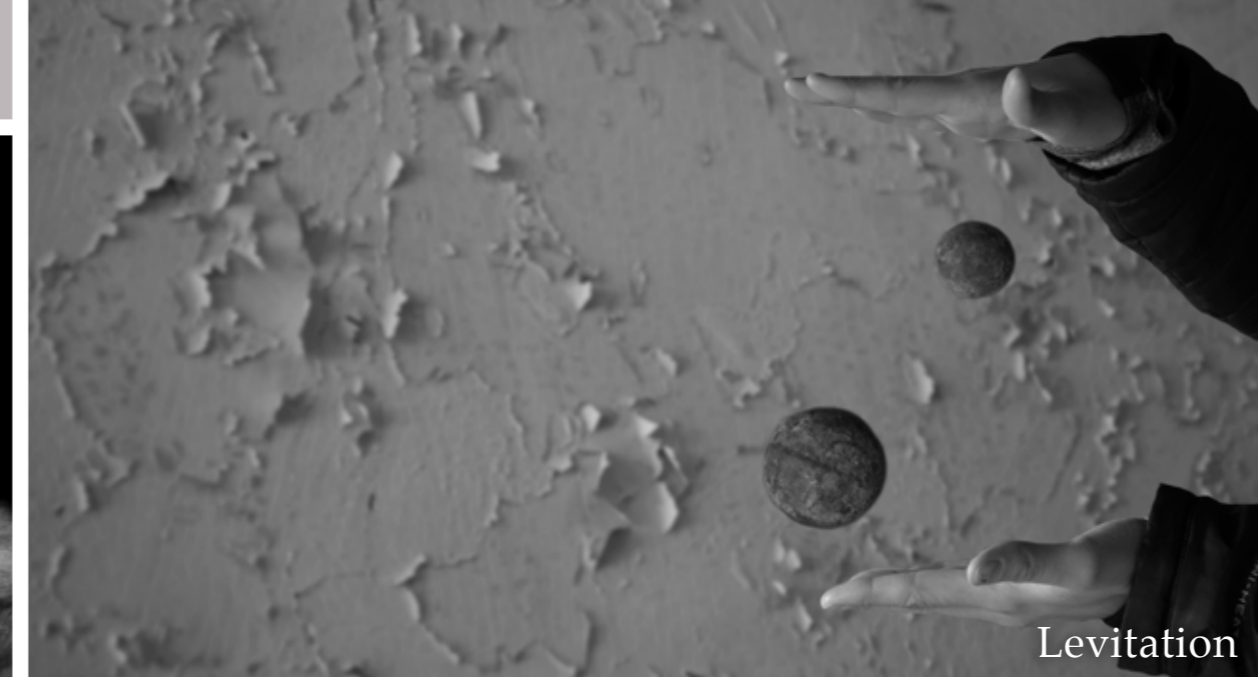


MACRO PHOTOGRAPHY.

CREATIVE EDITS.

We can take a subject and put them in a different background (composite), we can mask out certain parts of an image to make it seem like the subject is floating (levitation) or we can even combine multiple exposures of the same image to gain a larger depth of light (high-dynamic-range imaging)
